The late Tom Adams, an Architect deserves a special mention as he, along with others helped to reinvigorate the York Cat Trail, commissioning Sculptor Jonathan Newdick to produce Statues to be placed on buildings he either owned or worked on, as a kind of trademark. 



- W Q Starting from our York Lucky Cats shop. You will see the two newest cats in the window. Grab the leaflet from the shop and let's go cat hunting?
- I Turn right on leaving and walk to Lendal. Cross the road. Look back across the road from the entrance to Museum Gardens. Can you see the cat called Chambers? Clue: Accountancy Office
- Tollow Museum Street towards the Minster. Turn right onto High Petergate and then first right on Stonegate. Just look above the doorways and you will see Gordon, the pirate cat.
- (a) Retrace your steps and continue passing through Minster Gates, turning right at the Minster. Then find Goodramagate. Clue: Look for Veggie Cafe
- (b) Continue along Goodramagate, keep looking right to find a climbing cat called Hope. Clue: You can find some real cats there in the cat themed cafe below.
- Oontinue along Goodramagate to find a gate to the Holy Trinity Church, on the right hand side of the road. Look around the church grounds and you will find the memorial to York Minster cat, Gerald.
- (B) Continue along Goodramagate until the crossroad. Turn left to King's Square and left again onto St. Andrew's Gate. You will find a climbing kitten on house no. 1/2.
- Just next door on the house no. 1 you will find another cat balancing.
- (II) Retrace your steps back to King's Square. Turn left and look up. Clue: Tick-Tock
- **III** Keep walking along Colliergate another few steps to find another black cat. Clue: Two-dimensional cat
- (L) Retrace your steps to King's Square again and look up to the roof line to spot a cat chasing a pigeon.
- (B) Next follow the signs and the crowds towards the Shambles. One cat is climbing above our former Shop where The York Cat Trail story began and first and original York Lucky Cat was made.
- Look opposite, slightly left and spot another Shambles cat.

- (b) Continue down to the bottom of the Shambles. Look across the road and look for a ghostly looking cat going through the wall of the most haunted York pub. Clue: Look for a sheep
- (b) Cross the road, turn left and then right onto Fossgate. Continue to Walmgate. Keep left to find a gate between another haunted pub and hairdresser. The cat statue can be found in the back yard of the pub.
- (i) Back on the Walmgate and just opposite you will find another cat proudly sitting on the windowsill. Clue: Look for a horse head!
- A few meters further along Walmgate is a further statue above the restaurant doorway.
- (1) Retrace your steps along Walmgate turning left onto Merchantgate and right onto Picaddily and then left again to Coppergate. The cat will be looking at you from above the pub window.
- ② & ② Carry onto the end of Colliergate and then turn right to Low Ousegate to find a cat climbing the wall. Next cat is balancing on the windowsill on the neighboring building. They are the oldest cats on the trail.
- (2) & (2) Descend the steps towards the river and King's Steith. Continue along the river's edge until Friar's Terrace and South Explande join. Can you see two cats on the window ledges? Clue: If you are stuck look for a black gate going nowhere!
- Return to the bridge. Cross the road safely. On the middle of the bridge look right. If you have good ayes or binoculars, you will see a cat walking on the roof line of the brick building.
- Continue along Ousegate and turn left by the street crossing, returning to Coney Street. Halfway down the street a black cat will be lurking high on the window ledge. Clue: no. 25
